

Knowledge Hub Community of Practice – Projects Overview

 In 2024-25, PHAC supported 70 projects addressing the mental and physical health of those who have experienced, are experiencing, or are at risk of experiencing family violence.

 Included in these projects is the Knowledge Hub Community of Practice, which connects enhances the work of 24 intervention research projects.

• As a cohort, the 24 projects address a range of family violence issues, across the different levels of prevention and intervention.

PHAC's Preventing Family Violence Program

- The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) is investing up to \$18M per year until 2025-26 and over \$14M per year ongoing to support projects that:
 - Promote safe relationships
 - Prevent family violence (including intimate partner violence, youth dating violence, child maltreatment and the mistreatment of older persons)
 - Equip health professionals and service providers to recognize and respond safely to family violence
- PHAC's investments in this area aim to help build the evidence base of "what works" to prevent family violence.

The purpose of the annual report

Government-wide reporting

- Information from your reports is rolled up into Department-wide and government-wide reporting (e.g. PHAC's Departmental Results Report and WAGE's Departmental Results Report)
- These reports demonstrate to Parliament and to Canadians how public funds are being used
- They indicate how and whether PHAC is advancing its mandate

This is the reason we ask you to report quantitative data

Department/Program Management

- Your reports help us identify issues with program design, and learn from effective practices
- They allow us to respond to concerns and lessons learned at the individual project level
- They help us communicate the value, importance, and impact of the investment

This is the reason we ask you to tell us about challenges, successes, stories and things you are learning

Year 1: Getting started (2022-23)

- Setting up project team
- Seeking research ethics approval
- Recruiting participants
- Refining research design
- Establishing and building partnerships


Year 2: Program implementation began (2023-24)

- Adapting programming, as needed
- Delivering programming as pilots or at scale
- Many projects collected & analyzed qualitative data
- Some began collecting & reporting on quantitative data

Situating this year's results

- Year 3: Each their own path (2024-25)
 - Shifting phases of the project
 - Continuing program delivery, or wrapped up
 - Collecting and analyzing quantitative and qualitative data
 - Knowledge mobilization
 - Looking at different approaches to sustainability
 - 4 projects ended

Direct reach for 2024-25




Demographics of participant reach

82% participants reporting changes in knowledge and/or skills



86% participants reporting changes in behaviour



84% participants reporting improved health outcomes

Professionals



90% professionals/service providers report satisfaction with the training/resources



84% professionals/service providers reporting changes in knowledge and/or skills



84% professionals/service providers reporting changes in behaviour

Research Highlights

- Participants reported improvements in overall health & well-being, self-efficacy, decision-making & life satisfaction
 - They also demonstrated increased knowledge & understanding of the root causes of violence, the impact of trauma, & the services and skills available for supporting survivors

- Parents expressed improved confidence in parenting abilities & enhanced parent-child relationships, along with positive changes in children's behaviors (e.g. decreased aggression)
- Service providers & facilitators expressed increased knowledge & self-efficacy to create healthy social environments & support participants
- Programs allow individuals to express themselves, network with others, & receive clarity & social support





Supports, Challenges, and Adaptations for Program Implementation and Data Collection

Supports

- Maintaining relationships with collaborators
- Conducting regular meetings with community & external partners to obtain feedback
- Monitor progress

Adaptations

- Adapting program materials & processes
- Implementing project management practices
- Establishing & maintaining relationships with partners & advisory boards

Challenges

- Staffing turnover & changes
- Budget & capacity constraints
- Delays in ethics approvals & data collection
- Difficulties with participant recruitment

Common Themes



Factors that promote program accessibility:

- Flexible
- Culturally responsive
- Grounded in trust, collaboration & ongoing evaluation





Cultural competency and reconciliation were supported through:

- Community partnerships
- Cultural translation
- Trauma-informed training
- Adaptation of interventions to meet the needs of diverse groups





Factors that enhance **project** implementation:

- Strong foundational planning
- Meaningful engagement with participants and organizations
- Adaptability to the diverse needs and barriers faced by survivors and their families


